California Privacy Rights

California “Shine the Light” Law

Once a year, California residents who provide Personal Information in obtaining products or services for personal, family, or household use are entitled to request and obtain from us information regarding what, if any customer information we’ve shared with other businesses for their own direct marketing uses during the previous calendar year (e.g. requests made in 2021 will receive information regarding 2020 sharing activities). If applicable, this information would include the names and addresses of the businesses with whom the information was shared as well as the categories of customer information shared.

We will send you the requested information at your provided email address in response. Please note that some types of information sharing are not covered by the "Shine the Light" requirements and only information on covered sharing will be included in our response.

California Consumer Privacy Act

Under the California Consumer Privacy Act (“CCPA”), California residents have the right to know what personal information about them is collected, request deletion of their personal data, opt-out of the sale of their personal data, and not be discriminated against if they choose to exercise any of these rights. California Do Not Track

DNT is a feature offered by some browsers which, when enabled, sends a signal to websites to request that your browsing is not tracked, such as by third party ad networks, social networks and analytic companies. California Business & Professions Code Section 22575(b) (as amended effective January 1, 2014) provides that California residents are entitled to know how website operators respond to “Do Not Track” (DNT) browser settings. We do not collect Personal Information about users’ online activities over time and across third party websites when an individual uses our Sites and therefore do not respond to DNT signals.
